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## FOUR-YEAR EDUCATION PLAN

3.01 Presentation: Formation Through Music

The Board joined Paulette Chotowetz (Principal, Sacred Heart Academy) and Tashina Mackenzie (Teacher, Sacred Heart Academy) in the music room in which students from Kindergarten to Grade 5 performed portions of their choir spring concert. Faith was permeated into all of songs performed. Mrs. Mackenzie was acknowledged for her work with students, with Mrs. Chotowetz adding that all students are thoroughly engaged during class time.

3.02 Review Updated May Accountability Pillar Results

Superintendent Holowka reviewed the May 2024 Assurance Results received from Alberta Education. CTR's results are above the provincial average in all categories, including student learning engagement, citizenship, three and five-year high school completion rates, education quality, safe and caring, access to supports and services, and parental involvement. Results for all CTR's supplementary measures were also above the provincial average. Areas of strength and growth for the division have been identified and were also reviewed. Assurance results for each school will be analyzed to identify areas of strength and growth, with staff and students being consulted.

3.03 Four-Year Education Plan (Year Four) Review and Approval

Superintendent Holowka presented the 2021-2025 Four-Year Education Plan (Year Four) to the Board. It was noted that this is the last year of this four-year plan, and that the priorities of faith, academic excellence, and healthy schools remain the same. The domains in the Plan also remain the same being Student Growth and Achievement; First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Student Growth and Achievement; Teaching and Leading; Learning Supports; Governance and Faith. One change being made is to change "Faith" to "Catholic Faith" and to have it as the first domain, given faith is central to all work of the division. Superintendent Holowka reviewed the long term, medium term and short term outcomes for each domain, noting areas of focus in each.

# 5 REPORTS FROM WARD COMMITTEES

5.01 Trustees to identify one feature from each Ward Committee Meeting for Board Highlights

Chair Keenan (Foothills County) reminded Trustees to identify one feature from each Ward Committee Meeting for the May Board Highlights.

5.02 Brooks Ward Meeting April 16, 2024

Trustee de Jong (Brooks) highlighted the following from CTR Catholic's four pillars, as they pertained to the Brooks Ward Committee meeting:

**Faith:** All Brooks schools are highly engaged in student faith retreats. St. Luke's is planning a grad retreat but inviting all students. This includes a guided 5 km hike through UNESCO's Dinosaur Park Natural Preserve centered on wellness activities infused with prayers, focused on enjoying the beauty of Creation. St. Joseph's is also supporting a graduation retreat, as well as numerous other retreats including: Alpha retreats, student NET retreats, and Colm Leyne retreats. St. Joseph's has also used the Alpha materials to lead staff in a faith retreat. Christ The King is supporting a grade 8 graduation faith retreat, and other student retreats including grades 7 and 8 national evangelization teams (NET) retreats, and grades 5 and 6 school lead retreats. Holy Family Academy will be hosting a full day student faith day on Monday, May 13<sup>th</sup>. This event will feature Chris Bray, a praise and worship musician, who will lead a session based on CTR's Year 1 Faith Theme of "Encountering Beauty through Faith and Science". The session will also have teacher led sessions engaged in story, writing, art, and especially prayer.

**Learning:** The Holy Family Academy Drama Club started back up for the first time in many years. They participate at lunch and are hoping to create a production and perform a medley of Robert Munsch stories. This is supported solely by staff volunteers.

**Safe and Caring:** The middle and high school students in Brooks will participate in Many and One related events, including a guest speaker, activities centered on resilience and hope, and a prayer vigil in support of ending racism to end the week. Christ The King supports a Culture Week during the first week in May which is student led with participation from the larger community.

**Stewardship:** St. Joseph's and Christ The King are using the funds received from the collection on Catholic Education Sunday to help with retreat costs. Holy Family will use their funds to subsidize the purchase of grade 4 Bibles.

5.03 Strathmore Ward Meeting April 23, 2024

Trustee Salm (Strathmore) highlighted the following from CTR Catholic's four pillars, as they pertained to the Strathmore Ward Committee meeting:

**Faith:** The opening of the new church is the impetus for tremendous faith formation in the community. This reinvigoration of faith among students, staff, and families is significant for Strathmore. This will be the first time many enter into an actual church building.

**Learning:** The Holy Cross Collegiate Music program had all their ensembles compete at the Strathmore Performing Arts Festival in April. All groups received "Superior" ratings, which includes the HS Band, Grade 8/9 Band, Grade 7 Band, HS Drumline and HS World Drumming (image below). Kudos were given to Sarah Haughey, music teacher, and her students. The Drumline also competed at the Canadian Drumline Association Competition in Calgary and got 3rd place on April 19th. The Band students continue to practice for the Alberta Provincial Festival of Bands held in Red Deer on in May.

**Safe and Caring:** At the start of each Tuesday during the 50 days of Easter, students gather in the hallways and come into peace by experiencing the message of each Station of the Light for 10 minutes. This teaches students about our faith during the season of Easter and allows for a joyful return differing from the solemn Holy Thursday celebration held before the Easter holiday. Classes are also gifted with Holy water and a light to celebrate Easter. These actions and

gifts represent spiritual wellness practices that provide a calm start to the school day and promotes regulation through our faith.

**Stewardship:** The modernization of the Sacred Heart and Holy Cross spaces is ongoing with the expected completion in August. Ground will be broken in May to begin building the addition that supports a new band room and an enhanced high school chapel space. The renewal and expansion of the gymnasium for Sacred Heart will provide additional space for students to experience physical education and assemblies with the addition of a murphy stage in the gymnasium.

Trustee MacDonald (High River) highlighted the following from CTR Catholic's four pillars, as they pertained to the High River Ward Committee meeting:

**Faith:** St. Luke's dedication in bringing students to the Church is resulting in student engagement in learning about their faith. Many of these students are not Catholic but have a desire for participating in our faith. During these visits, students are welcomed to the altar and tour the Church. Father Mariuz talks about the stations of the cross and brings wonder and curiosity for the students about the symbols of our faith. These visits to the Parish are very invitational but draw many students to attend. Father provides testimony about his own faith journey, forming deep connections with students. Due to his incredible connection with students, he presides as the priest at the St. Luke's graduation, which is so appreciated by all students and staff.

**Learning:** Students within the High River community are supported within their significant transitions throughout their education. Holy Spirit Academy and Notre Dame Collegiate work together to support a grade 6 students' transition day where students meet their new teachers and take home NDC products that provide assurance and excitement about their next steps. This is followed by a parent night where some of the NDC parents come to HSA to speak with families.

NDC also supports a post-secondary fair to assist students with considering their next steps after graduation. Career counsellor Mr. Sekura will be piloting a new post-secondary career planning tool.

**Safe and Caring**: At Holy Spirit Academy, there are a high number of students with diverse learning needs. To provide a positive frame for these students in an inclusive setting, student diversity is celebrated through a school-wide Autism awareness day.

**Stewardship:** NDC parents prepared gift bags for St. Luke's students to provide them with treats and messages of hope as they drop in.

5.05 Okotoks Ward I Meeting May 22, 2024

Vice Chair Gustafson (Okotoks) highlighted the following from CTR Catholic's four pillars, as they pertained to the Okotoks Ward I Committee meeting:

Faith: Catholic Education Week was celebrated in each of the Okotoks Ward I schools, with the theme being "Courage to Lead". Activities included: students and staff sharing testimonials, Reconciliation being offered within schools, Divine Mercy Chaplet, Crowning of Mary, Eucharistic Adoration, school Masses, wearing blue in solidarity, "Buddy Rosaries" and living Rosaries. Administration, trustees, and the Superintendent also spoke at Masses in support of Catholic Education at the start of the week. CTR also presented and attended the provincial GrACE summit to support advocacy for publicly funded Catholic education across Alberta.

Learning: The study and showcasing within the fine arts were present in all schools across the Ward through incredible, high quality drama productions. Curricular tie-ins extended beyond fine arts and included CTS and visual art in the set design and technical support from the stage crew. These productions facilitated incredible community building among students and staff, nurturing a sense of belonging, confidence, and resiliency. Spring productions in the Ward schools include: Sound of Music at École Good Shepherd School, The Adams Family at St. John Paul II Collegiate; a "Musicville" production at St. Francis of Assisi Academy; and Little Mermaid at St. Mary's School.

Safe and Caring: Transitions of students into kindergarten, from grade 6 to grade 7, and those moving into high school are nurtured through welcoming and informational events across each of our Ward schools. Additionally, post-secondary presentations and scholarship presentations have been made available for students and parents who are near to the end of their K-12 school journeys. Schools are also focussed on celebrating students who are moving on from their current school through farewell and graduation activities. During all of these events it is evident how much students and families are welcomed into a place they see as their second "home" and a place where students are loved. Stewardship: Funds from school councils and the division support the purchase of important tokens of recognition for staff and students. This includes acknowledging students and staff receiving their sacraments, students who are transitioning to new schools or graduating, and meals for staff appreciation. Special acknowledgement will also be provided to St. Mary's School for their 25th anniversary occurring this year.

Superintendent Holowka and Associate Superintendent Kilcommons presented the proposed budget ending August 31, 2025, to the Board, highlights of which included:

- It is expected that the division will end the current year in a better position than expected due to the intentional stewardship of resources during the latter part of the current year.
- The proposed 2024/25 budget includes revenues of \$110,942,265 and expenses of \$112,201,117, resulting in a projected operating deficit of \$1,258,853 primarily due to inflationary pressures, rising classroom complexities and an unanticipated reduction in CTR's Geographical Community Grant.
- The operating reserve at the end of the 2024/25 year is projected to be just under \$5M. A modest reserve balance will be maintained to prepare for unanticipated shifts in future budgets, while continuing to transfer to capital for 2025/26 to support ongoing unsupported capital projects.
- Operating reserves entering August 2024 are expected to be \$4,922,392 (4.63%). Ministerial approval will be requested as this exceeds the 3.2% cap currently in place (which will be increased to 6.0% in 2024/25).
- Capital Reserves as of August 2024 are projected to be \$5,795,036. It is expected that this amount will be reduced to \$4,933,356 due to major projects for 2024/25.
- In summary, while the budget was funded for growth, it was reduced in various areas and does not consider inflationary pressures. As such, there are less funds available for students and schools. Priority will continue to be placed on classroom supports such as small class sizes, straight grade classes (where possible), and EA supports.
- Steps will be taken to reduce costs outside of the classroom, examples of this include reducing hospitality costs and streamlining leadership professional development.

#### 14 DIVISION

14.01 Trustees to identify one feature from each Superintendent's Report for the Board Highlights

14.02 Superintendents' Reports

Trustee MacDonald (High River) advised that the ASBA Zone 5 Edwin Parr event occurred on May 24, 2024. First-year teacher Jason de Jong from Christ The King in Brooks was CTR's nominee.

The ASBA SGM will occur in Calgary on June 2, 3 and 4, 2024. There will be a ministerial panel held on June 2<sup>nd</sup> with the Minister of Education attending.

Associate Superintendent Kilcommons advised that TEBA met with the ATA on May 28<sup>th</sup> to exchange envelopes. Another meeting will occur on June 7<sup>th</sup> to introduce proposals and obtain clarification and rational of the proposals. A further consultation with school divisions will occur prior to final negotiations. Central table negotiations will occur in the fall. TEBA will work through the summer to review the financial and operational implications of ATA's ingoing proposal.

Chair Keenan (Foothills County) reminded trustees to identify one feature per Superintendent report for the May Board Highlights.

Superintendent Holowka reported on the following:

- Feedback on areas of focus and the strategies for the 2024-2025 and the 2025-2026 Four-Year Education Plans was gathered from parents, students, staff, priests and administration at the following meetings: Council of School Councils, Superchats, ATA Liaison Committee, Divisional Administrators Meetings and from Ward Committee Meetings. All feedback received was considered by Sr. Administration in preparing the 2024-2025 Four-Year Education Plan and will assist in preparing the 2025-2026 Plan. Samples and an overview of this engagement feedback was shared with the Board.
- As per the Four-Year Education Plan, professional development plans must be articulated at the division level for execution within the upcoming year. Strategic planning has occurred to identify themes which have been shared with admin to allow them to align professional development at their school. An overview of the professional development for 2024-2025 was provided.
- Each school administration team was tasked with creating a Many and One Plan for execution in their school in 2024-2025. The Many and One Committee has reviewed these plans and will be providing feedback to administration and determining how the Committee can further support schools. Rationales and themes emerging from the Many and One Plans and from the work of the Committee as it is situated within Catholic Social Teachings will be shared during the Opening PD in August.

It was the will of the Board to highlight input from all stakeholders for the current and future Four-Year Education Plans from Superintendent Holowka's report in their May Board Highlights.

Deputy Superintendent Behm reported on the following:

 Enrollment in each school is being monitored by Human Resources to determine and assess pressure points, and a contingency has been set aside to address these pressure points in fall. The entire school and divisional

- context will be considered when pressure points are addressed. The prioritization of smaller class sizes remains for 2024-2025.
- The Spring Council of School Councils Meeting occurred on May 7<sup>th</sup> and was attended by school council chairs from across the division, parish priests, principals and superintendents. Parents of Distinction as nominated by the schools were recognized and celebrated for their work. Other items on the agenda were highlights from the school councils from Our Lady of the Snows Catholic Academy in Canmore and Holy Family Academy, Christ The King Academy, and St. Joseph's Collegiate in Brooks. Feedback was also sought from the school council chairs on the draft administrative procedure for conflict resolution and the Four-Year Education Plan. Parents appreciated the opportunity to provide feedback on both of these items.
- CTR is committed to providing appropriate recognition to its employees to
  ensure employees feel valued and celebrated. In May, recognition events
  were held for CTR's Edwin Parr nominees, ASBA's Zone 5 Edwin Parr
  nominees, and CTR's employees nominated for the Excellence in Teaching
  Award, the Above and Beyond Award, and the Power of One Award. These
  events celebrate staff contributions and promote and highlight the
  successes in the division and in schools.

It was the will of the Board to highlight the Spring Council of Councils Meeting from Deputy Superintendent Behm's report in their May Board Highlights.

Associate Superintendent MacDonald reported on the following:

- CTR is excited to pilot the new draft Social Studies curriculum in 2024-2025.
   Doing so will give teachers an opportunity to provide feedback to Alberta Education. To support the implementation of this new curriculum, work will be done this spring and over the summer to create Curriculum Support Documents (CSDs). Creating CSDs has been extremely beneficial for other core subjects in the past.
- Over the year, Superintendents attend Superchats with staff at each school, separately with the principals, and with the staff of the Catholic Education Centre and St. Thomas Centre. All Superchats for 2023-2024 have now been completed. During those meetings, staff members were asked 1. "What is going well and what do you want to continue focussing on for continuous improvement?" and 2. "What would further support you, in your role as a teacher, in teaching and learning?". Common themes in answer to these questions have been identified and were shared with the Board.
- CTR staff and administration recognize that going to Mass can be
  intimidating for students and families that are not familiar with it. It is for
  this reason that a "Going to Mass" guide has been created for distribution
  in each school. A digital copy is also available. The guide will be helpful to
  teachers to prepare students for Mass and for parents who choose to
  attend Mass with the school or have questions about Mass. The Calgary
  Diocese has reviewed the guide to ensure its accuracy.
- Through engagements with schools, administration became aware of staff and students who received the Sacraments of Initiation into the Catholic faith. Many commented on the impact that working at CTR and/or attending school at CTR had on them. Cards and bookmarks have been produced to recognize this call to faith. Some staff are "Telling their Story" through CTR's Social Media Campaign.

It was the will of the Board to highlight staff sacraments from Associate Superintendent MacDonald's report in their May Board Highlights.

Associate Superintendent Kilcommons reported on the following:

- Trustees were reminded to submit out-of-pocket expenses for the 2023-2024 year prior to the end of June. July and August expenses need to be submitted by August 31, 2024.
- In 2014 the Board of Trustees approved a 25-year agreement to purchase wind-powered electrical utilities as part of a consortium with 24 other school divisions. Currently, when there is insufficient wind energy, the division pays market rates on the electricity needed which can be higher than the contracted rate. To realize efficiencies, the consortium is working with a company developing battery storage of wind power. The energy stored could then be used when there is a shortage. This work is being done at no cost to the division, and it is estimated that storage could be in place in 2027.
- Work on the modulars at St. Joseph's Collegiate and Christ The King Academy has been delayed primarily due to lack of trades. Currently some minor deficiencies exist, and final demolition and landscaping dates have not yet been determined.
- Work on the modernization of Holy Cross Collegiate and Sacred Heart
  Academy in Strathmore is moving forward with the groundbreaking
  occurring at the beginning of May. Estimated construction costs have
  increased by approximately 50% due to inflation. The division is currently
  working with the contractor and ATCO regarding a gas line on the property.

It was the will of the Board to highlight the groundbreaking in Strathmore from Associate Superintendent Kilcommon's report in their May Board Highlights.

14.03 Program Review Selection for 2024-2025

As per Board Policy 28 – School Program Reviews, Superintendent Holowka reviewed the list of possible programs to be reviewed. She is recommending that Student Services be reviewed in the 2024-2025 year, which will coincide will with the implementation of Dossier.
