Carried **BUSINESS ARISING** 2 2.01 **Catholic Education Program** Associate Superintendent MacDonald shared that CTR will work with consultant Review - Update Jennifer Woo to pilot the Catholic School Identity Tool created last Spring to complete a review of the Catholic Education Program. This review was delayed a year so that the Catholic School Identity Tool could be developed for use by all Alberta school districts at the request of Bishop McGrattan. Director of Religious Education, Grant Gay, will work with Ms. Woo to conduct in-school interviews and visits. The tentative timeline for the review is January to March 2023. 2.02 Program Review - Technology -As per Board Policy 29, Superintendent Morrison indicated that the Technology Central Office Program at Central Office is to be reviewed this year. The Board identified that the consultant conducting the review should have knowledge of IT, administration, and infrastructure. Deputy Superintendent Behm is to consider this information and will bring back consultant recommendations to the Board. 2.03 **Ecole Good Shepherd School** Associate Superintendent Kilcommons advised that the Alberta Ministry of Update Education had designated \$100,000 for CTR to conduct necessary studies on the viability of renovations at Ecole Good Shepherd School. As many of these reports had been previously prepared, Stantec was retained to complete three reports at significantly less cost. The Ministry is now considering those reports. 2.04 Influencer Engagements and Associate Superintendent MacDonald confirmed a plan is being made to bring the Governance Board's wish to conduct community influencer engagement sessions to fruition. Drumheller and Assumption have already conducted their sessions and principals are being asked to find a date for their school's session. Trustees will be invited to these sessions. 2.05 Superchats – Meetings and Annually the Superintendents attend at each school for "Superchats" with Governance teachers and administration. This year's theme is teacher engagement, and like the community engagement sessions, will focus on the reputation of CTR in the community, areas of improvement and advocacy. Trustees will be invited to Superchats in their community. 2.06 **Outreach Facility** Superintendent Morrison shared details on a building that has become available for an outreach facility. It was noted that the enrollment numbers in the current facility warrant an expansion. Administration was thanked by the Board for their work in this area. Mark MacDonald (High River) moved: That administration move forward on the purchase of the outreach facility, while not exceeding limits approved by the Minister of Education. Motion #118-22

Meeting for Board Highlights

Chair Keenan (Foothills) reminded Trustees to identify one feature from each Ward Committee Meeting for the September Board Highlights.

7.02 Brooks Ward Committee

Meeting September 14, 2022

Trustee de Jong (Brooks) highlighted the following from CTR Catholic's four pillars, as they pertained to the Brooks Ward Committee meeting:

**Faith:** Administration and teachers at Christ The King and St. Joseph's continue to work hard on creating inclusive schools.

**Learning:** Holy Family, Christ The King, and St. Joseph's will be hosting an expert from the University of Alberta in a joint professional development session focused on intercultural problem solving.

**Safe and Caring:** Paul Davis, a popular online safety presenter, has been invited to speak to students at Holy Family, Christ The King, and St. Joseph's about online safety.

**Stewardship:** Prior to the pandemic, the total student population of Brooks expanded past the 1100 student mark for the first time. This year the student population of the CTR Brooks community is expected to exceed 1300 enrolled students for the first time. Holy Family has an enrollment of 448 students, Christ The King has an enrollment of 372 students, St. Joseph's Collegiate has an enrollment of 446 students, and St. Luke's Outreach Centre has an enrollment of 32.

7.03 Okotoks Ward II Committee Meeting September 15, 2022

Chair Kennan (Foothills) highlighted the following from CTR Catholic's four pillars, as they pertained to the Okotoks Ward II Committee meeting:

**Faith:** One of The Centre For Learning@HOME's partnership is the St. John's Choir group and they will be attending mass and singing at Our Lady of the Rockies Parish in Canmore.

**Learning:** St. Luke's Outreach has the most "academic streaming" students they've ever had. It further demonstrates that students in outreach attend St. Luke's for new reasons and have different abilities and aspirations.

Safe and Caring: The Centre for Learning@HOME is sending over 100 students to Camp Kindle for a three-day retreat to build relationships. The CFL recently they had over 240 students attend their annual picnic in Devon. More are planned in 5 other locations. The Program Enhancement Coordinators are running a full slate of activities in Okotoks, Red Deer, Edmonton, Grand Prairie, Medicine Hat and Lethbridge.

**Stewardship:** St. Luke's enrollment is up by 52 students (45%) and The Centre For Learning@HOME is up by 214 students (10%). Both schools will continue to rise until the very end of September.

**Learning:** Assumption School was awarded the 2022-2023 Alberta Foundation for the Arts — Artist & Education Theatre Residency of \$8100. This will be a great opportunity for students to learning about the arts in a small school without specialists to teach the arts.

Safe and Caring: Every child eats breakfast at the school every morning and parents are now donating food to support this practice. One of the reasons parents donate is because they want their children to eat at school to avoid even earlier mornings due to long bus rides. For these parents, it's a time issue rather than a financial issue.

**Stewardship:** The Board meeting will be in Oyen on October 22nd. On October 21st, there will a student led Mass at 5 p.m., a parent prepared potluck at 6 p.m., and an outdoor movie and bonfire at 7:30 p.m.

10.01 ACSTA Directors' Meeting Update

Trustee Gustafson advised that the Directors of ACSTA met on September 8 and 9, 2022. Highlights include the following:

- Their theme for the year will be "Walking Together in Catholic Education".
- Discussions are underway for a Catholic teacher formation symposium similar to that held in 2014.
- Their budget has been passed and will be presented to school boards soon. Of note is an increase to membership fees.
- A special general meeting will be held shortly to vote on new bylaws. The bylaws will be provided to school boards in November.
- ACSTA has a new website which now has a members' area.
- A Catholic Education toolkit is being prepared and will be distributed to provincial election candidates.
- A speaker has been confirmed for their S.P.I.C.E Retreat (April 27 to 30, 2023) and Blueprints Retreat (May 2 to 5, 2023) in Kananaskis.

10.02 ACSTA Fall General Meeting Attendance

# 11 ALBERTA SCHOOL BOARDS ASSOCIATION

11.01 ASBA Zone 5 Report

Trustee MacDonald attended the ASBA Zone 5 meeting on September 9, 2022. Highlights include the following:

 Ron Taylor has retired, and Nathan Freed is the new Field Services Representative. Nathan shared the following:

- that there will be a \$39M increase in transportation funding over three years.
- o A task force to strengthen career skills for students is being created.
- There is a mental health in schools call for proposal of \$10M dollars in funding each of two years. In addition to this there will be an additional \$87M over three years for mental health, addiction and pediatric support.
- Sixty-four requests to access operating reserves have been received.
- The online teacher registry went live on August 30, 2022.
- Executive members are meeting with UPC leadership candidates.
- CSBA will be hosted by ASBA July 3-5, 2023 in Banff.
- The Fall General Meeting will be held November 20 to 22, 2022.

Registration has not yet opened for the ASBA FGM. Board members advised whether they could attend.

12.01 TEBA – Status of Collective Bargaining Association

Associate Superintendent Michael Kilcommons advised that CTR has been in

contact with the local Alberta Teacher Association to open local bargaining. Once

Trustee Chung advised that as CTR's representative, he recently attended a TEBA meeting. He intends to let his name stand as a Director of the TEBA Board. The Board was supportive of Trustee Chung's decision.

#### 13 DIVISION

- 13.01 Trustees to identify one feature from each Superintendent's Report for the Board Highlights
- 13.02 Superintendents' Reports

Chair Keenan (Foothills County) reminded trustees to identify one feature per Superintendent report for the September Board Highlights.

Superintendent Morrison reported on the following:

- Permission has been granted by the Minister of Education to spend up to \$1M on an outreach facility in Brooks or High River.
- No official news has been received on the renovations required on the Strathmore schools.
- Enrollment in CTR schools is up by 4.2% over 2019-2020 (the last comparable year as pre-pandemic), enrollment increases are as follows: Okotoks 1.5%; Brooks 10%; High River -1.3%; Canmore 0.5%; Drumheller 3.7%; Oyen 7.3%; Strathmore -5.9%; CFL 9.8%; and St. Luke's 52.6%.
- In response to the Influencers' Engagement Session feedback, a principals
  focus group was formed to consider parent communications. After
  reviewing results of a parent survey, the focus group has made
  recommendations for communications with parents.
- Work continues to have Franco Sud added to the property title in Canmore.
   CTR's legal counsel is being consulted and a meeting with representatives from Franco Sud will follow.

It was the will of the Board to highlight school enrollment from Superintendent Morrison's report in their September Board Highlights.

Deputy Superintendent Behm reported on the following:

- New teacher orientation was held for two days in August 2022. The feedback received from new teachers was positive.
- The teacher members for the Liaison Committee have now been named. It
  was noted that there is no representative from the Okotoks/High River area.
  This will be added to the agenda for the November 10<sup>th</sup> meeting.

- Occasionally administration receives inquiries related to teacher faith.
   Private teacher information must be respected when responding. Senior administration is developing a resource to assist administration in this regard.
- CTR is now fully staffed. However, it was noted that recruitment of certificated staff has been challenging as traditional recruitment strategies were not available during the pandemic. It is hoped that these practices will return this year, especially considering the increase of retirements, leaves and resignations occurring. Rural communities pose a unique challenge and ways to respond are being considered.
- The Education (Reforming Teacher Profession Discipline) Amendment Act will come into force on January 1, 2023. This is a positive improvement, and the Amendment Act will apply to teachers and teacher leaders.

It was the will of the Board to highlight that schools are fully staffed across the division from Deputy Superintendent Behm's report in their September Board Highlights.

Associate Superintendent MacDonald reported on the following:

- Curriculum Support Documents completed to support new curriculum implementation are now housed on one website. These documents have been shared and other school divisions are also utilizing them. CTR and Director of Learning, Cheryl Kuemper, have been recognized provincially for this work.
- Literacy and numeracy assessments are now occurring in Grades 2 and 3. Funding will be based on the number of at-risk students identified. Grade 1 students will be assessed in January.
- Material for each grade level for the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation has been created by Indigenous Lead teachers.
- Elder Randy Bottle has been visiting schools and has become a great support in helping CTR to grow in understanding and assisting in permeating Indigenous culture.
- Elder Randy Bottle is working with CTR to draft a new Land Acknowledgement. The draft version is currently being used while consultation with stakeholders is being conducted.
- Diploma results analysis is well underway to determine areas of concern and how to improve results.
- A template to assist in the duty to report student disclosures has been prepared and shared with administration.

It was the will of the Board to highlight Curriculum Support Documents and their use by other Alberta school divisions from Associate Superintendent MacDonald's report in their September Board Highlights.

Associate Superintendent Kilcommons reported on the following:

- Mileage reimbursement has increased to \$0.53/km.
- The Town of Okotoks has determined St. John Paul II as the best location for a multi-sport complex. The Town will be 100% responsible for maintenance and liability and the school will have full access during school hours. A formal agreement is pending.
- Lawsuits from 2010 against CTR have been dismissed without costs and are almost resolved in their entirety.
- There is a severe shortage of bus drivers in the province. CTR has responded
  by doubling routes, rerouting buses, and offering driver incentives for
  recruitment. Transportation Coordinator Vaness Douville was recognized for
  her communications with parents and proactive problems solving.
