3 FOUR-YEAR EDUCATION PLAN

3.01 Updated

Superintendent Holowka advised the Board of the requirement of Alberta Education's Funding Manual for school authorities to obtain stakeholder engagement for the Four-Year Education Plan. This engagement is being done through the Ward Committee meetings, Superchats, and most recently with principals and vice principals at their April meeting. The feedback gathered is not only helpful in preparing the Four-Year Education Plan, but it is valuable in identifying needs which can then be brought forward in advocacy efforts.

Superintendent Holowka shared with the Board the material presented to administrators, which included a review of data and new areas requiring focus, engagement feedback received at Ward Committee meetings and Superchats, existing and new strategies in the current Four-Year Education Plan, and considerations for the 2024-2025 Four-Year Education Plan. At several points during this presentation, feedback was gathered from administrators from both a divisional and individual school perspective. This feedback will be considered in preparing the 2024-2025 Four-Year Education Plan that will be presented to the Board for approval in May.

Chair Keenan (Foothills County) reminded Trustees to identify one feature from each Ward Committee Meeting for the April Board Highlights.

5.02 Canmore Ward Meeting April 9, 2024

In the absence of Trustee Bogdanowski (Canmore), Superintendent Holowka highlighted the following from CTR Catholic's four pillars, as they pertained to the Canmore Ward Committee meeting:

Faith: Bishop McGrattan's visit of the school and Shrine in Canmore allowed students to participate in learning about His role and the importance of Catholic education. Bishop McGrattan was very pleased with Our Lady of the Snows' support of Catholic education. Having Bishop present at Mass was also beautiful to observe. His ability to interact with students has been a wonderful witness of his pastoral presence.

Learning: Student options in secondary are being reviewed to best support the scheduling of the students who are vulnerable. Options with numbers that are viable are being upheld. Students will be asked what they would like to take before options are scheduled. Further, the schedule will be constructed with students' differentiated course and learning needs in mind. Scholarships from the community also focus on supporting students with a variety of learning gifts and needs. This demonstrates the value of all students regardless of interest or inherent academic ability.

Safe and Caring: School tours for new families have been very impactful and well received among new parents at all grade levels. Forty to fifty families are being supported with tours as they consider registration for their children. This is further supported by information evenings for new families. Kindergarten information evenings have already occurred, with similar meetings for grade 6 and 9 families occurring soon.

Stewardship: The school council at OLS has been engaged with fundraising to enhance school activities and learning opportunities. This has enriched the

community of the school in many ways. However, an added benefit experienced by the school is the partnership that school council has created with the parish to support pick up of flower sales in Advent and during the spring at the Shrine.

5.03 Oyen Ward Meeting April 12, 2024

Trustee Rude-Volk (Oyen) highlighted the following from CTR Catholic's four pillars, as they pertained to the Oyen Ward Committee meeting:

Faith: The Face-to-Face retreat for grade 5 and 6 students will be occurring in Oyen this year. The same couple that has been supporting the school for many years will host the event. This is an incredible experience for the students. There will be a campout at the local campground and faith-based learning that will serve to form students. Families participate in the retreat and an increase in fathers' participation in the event is often seen.

Learning: One School One Book event around the book Stone Fox begins after Easter. Each student receives a book and bookmark with prompting questions. The students read at home and then discuss in reading groups at the school. A full school display shares the book and related student findings. The students celebrate the book at the tailgate hotdog party. This is a tradition that occurs every other year.

Safe and Caring: Through fundraising efforts over a five-year period, along with matching grants, Assumption was able to build a new playground with a company named Playworks. The playground equipment removed from Assumption was shipped to Cambodia in 2023. Working with local volunteers and with government support, Playworks resurrected the playground in Cambodia, which is now enjoyed by many.

Stewardship: A good works project during Lent provided backpacks for clients at the Mustard Seed. Sixteen backpacks were filled with chocolates, letters from students, mittens, and other items. These were shared with clients that came in for counseling at the Mustard Seed. They were very impactful, and the school expects that some clients will write back to students in response to the letters provided.

Trustee elections and whether they should be held separate from municipal elections was also discussed, along with the possibility of trustees having to declare party affiliation. In reviewing ASBA's proposed budget, Trustee MacDonald noted that ASBA membership fees will be increasing.

11 DIVISION

11.01 Trustees to identify one feature from each Superintendent's Report for the Board Highlights

Chair Keenan (Foothills County) reminded trustees to identify one feature per Superintendent report for the April Board Highlights.

Superintendent Holowka reported on the following:

- Considerable time has been spent implementing the recommendations of the Catholic Education Review completed last year. Goals identified for the 2023-2024 year included faith formation, embedding Catholic Social Teachings into curriculum and permeation of faith in all subject areas, reengaging in school-based retreats and a refocus on faith. Actions taken include the creation of the faith plan aligning with the Diocesan Renewal, the work of the Many and One Committee, preparing templates for schoolbased retreats, linking parish/school/home connections, and reinvigorating the joy of teaching Catholic education in classrooms and schools.
- Superintendent Holowka met with Bishop McGrattan over the Easter break.
 She shared with him CTR's faith plan that aligns with Diocesan Renewal.
 Bishop McGrattan expressed his gratitude and support of this initiative.
 Other items discussed were charter school emergence in rural Alberta and the impact this could have on Catholic education, and provincial formation processes for Catholic education in contrast to charter school formation.
 Opportunities to partner with Catholic families to pursue alternative forms of education was also discussed to ensure alignment with the Bishop's expectations for Catholic education.
- Superintendent Holowka will engage in a one-on-one meeting with each principal by the end of the year. This will allow for continued conversation about their schools and leadership. The meetings will also allow for continued knowledge, coherence and support throughout the division. Significant findings will be shared with the Board and used to shape plans for next year.

It was the will of the Board to highlight the meeting with Bishop McGrattan from Superintendent Holowka's report in their April Board Highlights.

Deputy Superintendent Behm reported on the following:

- Robust support is provided to teachers and teacher leaders through CTR's growth, supervision and evaluation process as set out in Administrative Procedure PER #16. This process and the supports provided ensures students have outstanding teachers and teacher leaders. Deputy Superintendent Behm will share information on this process with School Council Chairs at the Spring Council of School Councils meeting occurring on May 7, 2024. Information on this process has been previously shared with parents at School Council meetings.
- To further support the teacher growth, supervision and evaluation process, Dossier, a new software is being implemented next year. Dossier will be integrated with CTR's other software platforms and will greatly reduce the amount of inputting needed by teachers and supervisors. Administration had the opportunity to test the system and provide feedback for efficiencies.
- Classroom complexity funding from Alberta Education is again being provided to schools. CTR will receive \$451,183.50 based on a weighted moving average. These funds will allow schools to address classroom complexity by adding more classroom support staff as they deem best.
- Leaders who are no longer part of the Alberta Teachers' Association become
 members of the College of Alberta School Superintendents (CASS). CASS
 recently made changes to their governing document to support meeting the
 Leadership Quality Standards and the Superintendent Leadership Quality
 Standards. Minimum requirements for continuing education have been
 established and accreditation is lost if the requirements are not met.

It was the will of the Board to highlight teacher growth, supervision and evaluation from Deputy Superintendent Behm's report in their April Board Highlights.

Associate Superintendent MacDonald reported on the following:

- Students from grades 4, 7 and 10, staff and parents completed the CTR Faith Survey in February and March. Results are analysed on an overall basis and for each individual school. Many satisfaction rates increased slightly, and all overall results are above 90%. Results will be used to inform practices in schools and steps moving forward.
- Catholic Education week will occur the week of May 5 10, 2024. Divisional events planned were reviewed, some of which include daily prayers being prepared for use in schools, adoration, and prayers of the faithful. Trustees and/or administration will also speak at Mass on May 5th. Some of the activities that will occur in schools include family picnics, service projects, rosary making, attendance at Mass and community cleanups to care for God's creation.
- CTR's student management system is also being converted to Dossier. The
 system will allow for the improved management and tracking of individual
 support plans resulting in significant time savings and effective
 collaboration of resources. Standardized workflows and comprehensive
 reporting prepared will provide visibility to key data, trends and results,
 which will be useful in tracking student growth, applying for grants and
 reporting. Currently, teachers and administrators are testing the software
 and providing feedback for implementation in 2024-2025.

It was the will of the Board to highlight the implementation of Dossier from Associate Superintendent MacDonald's report in their April Board Highlights.

Associate Superintendent Kilcommons reported on the following:

- Collections from Masses in CTR's community parishes for Catholic Education Sunday have been provided to the division in the amount of \$6,400.76. These funds are provided to schools on a per student allocation. It is preferrable that these funds be spent in the current school year with religious intent. Spending of the funds is to be reported to the Superintendent and Ward as soon as possible.
- Each year, schools are provided with funds for their school operating budget for items such as textbooks, field trips, paper, etc. To date, all school operating budgets remain in a positive position.
- The modernization of Holy Cross Collegiate and Sacred Heart Academy in Strathmore is moving ahead as projected, and it is expected that construction will begin in May. School administrators are consulted regularly, and planning is being done to minimize the impact on student learning.
- Updated drawings have been shared for the new build of the replacement school for École Good Shepherd School. The development permit has been submitted and it is hoped that it will be approved in May. The province will

initiate a request for qualifications soon which will be due in June. After that they will release a request for proposals which will be due in the fall.

It was the will of the Board to highlight funds from Catholic Education Sunday from Associate Superintendent Kilcommon's report in their April Board Highlights.

11.03 Draft Budget Review

Superintendent Holowka and Associate Superintendent Kilcommons advised that the 2024-2025 funding manual was shared on Holy Thursday, as was the divisional funding profile. The budget is the largest to date with a substantial increase in education. CTR's funding profile allows for anticipated growth in enrolment. The proposed divisional budget will be presented to the Audit Committee prior to being presented to the Board for approval on May 29, 2024.
